

Following the cancellation last year due to COVID, the 16th annual WA Youth Cattle Handlers Camp will be held between 15-17 April at the Brunswick Showgrounds. Once again, the Camp was fully booked out long before the registration date closed. 100 young people between the ages of 8-25 from all over WA will be taking part in the three-day event, as well as many presenters and volunteers who are essential to the smooth running of the Camp. The Recreation Centre will house the attendees and the Alan Evans Selling Complex will be the centre of catering and activities. The aim of the Camp is to ensure cattle handling skills are not lost within the industry. Each participant will be responsible for the care of either a beef or dairy animal, from its bedding, feeding, watering and grooming - culminating with presentation for judging on the final day. Wonderful friendships are formed and each student leaves the Camp with a great sense of achievement and confidence. If you see what looks like the Brunswick Show with all the cattle in the stalls, you are welcome to call in and see what is all about. Another great event that puts Brunswick on the map!

Happy Easter! Brunswick homes were decorated with rosemary and red ribbons, as flowers and homemade wreaths were placed on letterboxes and front pillars and fences. This year, we thank local volunteers who have again rallied to organise the annual Anzac service in Brunswick. beginning with a march and then a service in the Brunswick Town Hall. Look out for details in this edition.

The Brunswick Town Hall this year celebrates its 85th birthday. Records show the "front", which faces South-West Highway, was built around 1920 to commemorate those fallen in war, while the "side" facing Ridley Street was added in 1936. The section now used as the main entrance has the words "Established 1936" above the doors. Once the busy home of all local weddings, balls, dances, recitals and cabarets, it is now still used for many events by residents and community groups. The Moospaper joins the community in thanking the Shire of Harvey for maintaining this beautiful building, which is a big part of our town's history and holds many wonderful memories. "It was an absolute pleasure meeting with Greg and listening to his stories. With plans to stay in touch, he is keen to see more young people working in the justice system."





The Power of Women's Friendship... More than 60 years ago a group of young Brunswick women gathered in an early version of the Mothers' Groups we see today. These remarkable friends have met every month ever since, gathering in friendship more than 700 times, over more than six decades! It is heart-warming and inspiring to think of the camaraderie and support that these women have given to each other. So many experiences have been shared over the years, from enormous joy to tragic loss and everything in between. They have provided with invaluable each other friendship, mentorship, care, and support As the world once again pauses to acknowledge International Women's Day it is poignant to reflect on the impact that this women's group has had, not only for these women but also for their community. The resilience of their 'Ladies Afternoon' group is truly inspiring and stems from a true team effort by each of them. Every month a different person still hosts 'Afternoon Tea' in her home with everyone 'bringing a plate'. Maud Stanley, who hosted the very first gathering remembers. 'In the early days, we talked about babies, then teenagers and later grandchildren. Now many of us have greatgrandchildren! I remember us having Ladies Afternoon the day Cyclone Alby came along, and we decided that we all needed to go home early

that day to avoid the storm! 'Through the 1960s and into the 1970s their children would get off the School bus at the appropriate home to enjoy their own afternoon tea before heading home with their mothers. That way the children also created strong friendships, and some are still great friends today. As time went on the children grew up and moved on but the ladies continued to meet. Together these women have faced life's journeys, each one giving and receiving so much from this remarkable group. Over time, some moved away but they all kept in contact and found ways to continue to catch up. Now spread from Perth to Augusta, with one who lived many years in the USA, the connection is just as strong as ever and their monthly gatherings continue with as many as possible attending. Maud explains the longevity of the group saying, 'We all make it a priority to get their every month if we possibly can. We value our friendship, and our catch-ups are a wonderful tradition that we all enormously.' Recently, nine wonderful friends gathered for a special celebration at Stirling Cottage in Harvey to honour 60 years of their remarkable group. One had travelled from Perth on the train while others travelled from across the south-west. What a buzz! The chatter of catching up, the warmth of reminiscing, the power of woman's friendship.



Brunswick Junction CRC has recently been a successful recipient of funding from the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development for a Technology and Innovation Grant. The Centre applied for an upgrade of customer and staff computers, identifying the benefit of ensuring customers have access to quality technology to fill their needs, as well as staff being able to assist more efficiently - in the 2019-20 financial year we supported 1,174 customers with a range of IT accessible services.

One of the things that BJCRC prides themselves on, is assisting clients with job ready skills. With limited transport in and out of Brunswick this is a service we are presently providing and hope to develop in partnering with or becoming a job network agent. As changes in IT technology are ongoing, it can sometimes be a challenge to keep up, so the BJCRC team continuously look for opportunities to support and improve access for the community.

THE WAR- UK

I was five years old when the second world war started. Stratford-on-Avon where I was born and raised had no strategic importance so was largely unaffected by the conflict at least from a military point of view. From a lifestyle point of view, it was far different, although at five years of age I was blissfully unaware of this. Like all children, I assumed that my lifestyle was normal. That's not to say I was unaware that a worldwide conflict was in progress. My older brother had a world map pinned up on the wall with coloured pins showing which side controlled the various areas and we listened to the BBC news every night. The newsreaders became household names, Bruce Belfrage, Stuart Hibberd and Alvar Lidell and also the correspondents from war zones, Richard Dimbleby (farther of David) and Wynford Vaughan-Thomas. Rationing came into force and everyone was issued with little books of coupons for their rations of sugar, butter, meat and, later, most other foods and, for the rich folk with motor cars, petrol. These coupons were cancelled with a rubber stamp or snipped out of the book with scissors by the shopkeeper at the time of purchase. Being a smallish town in a country area my parents were able to supplement the rations with locally bought goods and homegrown vegetables and eggs. One of my early duties was to take buckets of kitchen food scraps to a house around the corner where they had chickens and exchange them for eggs. We never went hungry. One bomb fell on Stratford in the whole of the war and this was jettisoned from a German bomber trying to escape from a British fighter and hoping to lighten his load. It blew a large hole in the Grammar School playing field which had been planted with potatoes as part of the war effort and was a great attraction for a few days before it was filled in. On the night of November 14th, 1940 the Germans launched a massive air raid on the city of Coventry, about twenty miles from Stratford. My father woke me and took me outside to the back garden to see it. I can still remember the white flashes of the big bombs, the smoky orange glow in the sky from the fires and the deep thumps from the explosions and the anti-aircraft guns.

Some days later we used some of our precious petrol ration to go to Coventry to see the destruction. In the city centre, the roads had been mostly cleared but between them were just heaps of rubble. Sometime later I witnessed another tragic event. It was customary whenever we heard an aircraft to rush outside to identify it. On one occasion I did just this and watched a small training aircraft fly past down the line of the street, as it went overhead the engine started to falter and as it reached the end of the street the engine stopped, the left wing dropped and the aircraft went down out of my sight behind the house next door. I rushed out into the road to see a mass of flames on a small traffic island at the end of the road. My mother came out and ushered me away from the scene. The instructor and the trainee were both killed and the Air Force came and cleared away all the wreckage leaving only a few scorched bushes and a few bits and pieces for souvenir hunters to gather up. As previously mentioned I was pretty much unaware of any shortages but I do recall being very jealous of one of my brother's friends who had some lead model soldiers from before the war. Toys were almost unobtainable and I did not see a banana until I was ten years old. Many middle-class homes had their iron fences removed for scrap and good citizens handed in their aluminium saucepans to be made into aircraft. I also remember my father's excitement upon buying a box of dates after the end of hostilities. these came in biodegradable packaging or, as we called, it a small wooden box. I was ten years old when the war ended but life in England was pretty austere for some years after that.
