


Last dance with Jo, but Dance Moo...d to continue

Collecting some of the hall's stories of bygone days, it will come as little surprise that there was much music, mischief and more as the townspeople enjoyed the facilities that the hall offered and continues to provide. Stories that the four walls could tell have been procured from local sources and will be retold throughout the evening at the event. Special memories that reflect the hall's importance in the lives of its community.

Judy Talbot (OAM) remembers the "Night in the Orient Ball", hosted by the Brunswick Junior Farmers on August 5th 1961.

"Chinese lanterns, coloured lights hanging from a low ceiling and bamboo fences all added to the atmosphere. More than 450 people attended and as guests arrived they were presented with a spray of camellias or a set of chop sticks.

Bowls of almond blossoms and silver sprayed berries decorated the foyer and stage, and a huge painting of a dragon and Chinese writings and posters completed the setting. I remember one of the organizers had gone to chemists shops and was given out of date perfume to spray around the building ... the only problem was. some guests were allergic to the smell and spent time outside on the footpath. Miss Gail Phillipe of Harvey was judged Miss Cheong-sam and Miss Judy Piggott of Brunswick, Belle of the Ball."

Tickets for the event are limited, so first in, best dressed, as they say - could be an opportune moment to host our own Belle of the Ball 2021!



Waterborne adventures.

When I was about seventeen three mates and I decided to go on a canoeing/camping trip down the Avon. We borrowed one homemade canoe and hired a second one from a local boatyard. After loading all our gear we set off with best mate Roger and me in the homemade vessel which was made up of a wooden frame covered in aluminium sheeting. We very soon found that it leaked and a bit of rearranging of gear and bailing was required. Not only was the canoe homemade but the paddles were too and they consisted of broomsticks with bits of leftover aluminium sheet nailed on both ends. After about three hundred yards the blade on one end of Roger's paddle fell off and I watched it drift down in the water like a falling leaf. As luck would have it the hired canoe had a couple of spare paddles so we pressed on. The next hurdle was the weir opposite Holy Trinity Church so we had to go ashore and make a very professional "portage" and relaunched below what was then the Great Western Railway bridge. I understand that nowadays this part of the river is navigable by decentsized craft but in those days this was not the case. There was a mixture of shallow, stony parts where we were scraping the bottom, pleasant slow-flowing reaches and some parts where the reeds and bulrushes encroached so far that only a narrow fast flowing path remained. Going downstream was easy going, altogether a very pleasant day. Approaching evening we found a suitable place to camp just above Bidford on Avon and then realized than no one had brought any water. I guess we all figured that being on the river water would not be a problem. The only liquids we had between us were a bottle of whiskey and a bottle of Roses lime juice. The others decided to forgo a drink but yours truly was rather thirsty so I made up a mixture of one-third murky river water, one third lime juice and one-third whiskey. My theory was that the alcohol would sterilize the water, the water would dilute the lime juice and the lime juice would make the mixture palatable. I was wrong on three counts. After tea, the others proposed we should walk into Bidford and get a drink at the pub.

We set off and soon reached the road but by this time I was rolling drunk and my good companions left me propped up against a signpost with the promise that they would collect me on the way back. They must have done so for in the morning I awoke in my tent with my head outside on the grass. Thoughtful friends as they were they said they didn't want me being sick in the tent. We packed up and resumed our journey but under the road bridge the water was so shallow we had to get out and half carry and half drag the boats along. Just below the bridge Roger stepped on a broken bottle and cut his foot open. Joe went with him into the village to look for a doctor and returned about an hour later to tell us that the doctor they found had fixed up the wound and as he was going to Stratford, anyway had taken Roger home. A brief council of war decided that discretion was the better part of valour and we should turn back before the casualty count got any higher. It was about then that I discovered that going upstream is a different kettle of fish entirely. The quiet stretches were fine but getting through the rapids single-handed required inventing new techniques as I went along. It took me a long hard day to get back to where we started and then we still had to carry all the gear home and return the borrowed canoe to its owner. Just to show that I am a complete idiot a few years later I again went on the river in a canoe with Roger. This time we went upstream in a hired craft and somehow we managed to roll it. Roger, being fully dressed, stuck out for the bank and I, not being able to swim, hung on to the overturned canoe. Luckily there was an expert kayaker passing and he somehow exited his craft and pushed me and the canoe to the bank. I was most concerned that I had lost my wallet with my Air Force Identity card in it but when we dragged the canoe out of the water the wallet was still inside my jacket if a trifle soggy. Since then I have adopted the theory that water is sometimes quite nice to look at but not something you want to get involved with.
