On Tuesday 15th of June Brunswick received their first Foodbank order. The Brunswick CRC was amazed at how great the value for money is with these orders.

The Fruit and Veggie Box was only \$5 for the ENTIRE box, as shown in the photo, as well as the meat packs, \$15 for a decent sized meat pack, impressive.

For those wishing to access this service please see the CRC to sign up as a Food Bank client. The CRC has advised that all assessments are individually based and that there is no set criteria in place for this service.

The CRC will take individual orders and payment, submit a bulk order to Food Bank who will then deliver to the CRC on the allocated monthly date.

Orders for July need to be submitted by Tuesday 20th July with the delivery being Tuesday 27th July.




The BMS had been given a load of the jarrah planks from the old stables. It was a bit warped and bloody hard but perfect for the boxes. Decked out in ear muffs, goggles, visor and gloves Chris can be seen gingerly sliding planks through the thicknesser and cutting forty five degree corners concerned that the blades might disintegrate, which they haven't.

When completed the boxes will be assessed by the Department of Main Roads as they are supposed to collapse if hit by a vehicle. It was suggested that we test one but so far no one has volunteered their vehicle. One observer reckoned you could derail a train with the current box.

#### **REGIONAL YOUTH DRIVER EDUCATION PROGRAM**

Raine Torrisi from the Regional Youth Driver Education (RYDE) Program visited the staff at the Community Resource Centre on Monday the 14th of June. Ms Raine signed up two of the ladies, Natalie Norris and Nicola Van Dijk as Support Workers for the program.

RYDE, as it is known, connects learner drivers to volunteer mentors and a program vehicle to help them complete their 50 hours of experienced driving.

The RYDE program is a response developed by the town of Bassendean to the Western Australian Government's change from 25-50 supervised driving hours in November 2012.

If you're aged 16-25, currently a learner driver and need help getting experience behind the wheel, then RYDE might be for you.

Each driving session is 90 minutes and costs just \$15.

#### Lining the route (part 1)

After Queen Elizabeth's Coronation in 1953 she and Prince Phillip went on a tour of important cities around the country, one of which was Cardiff in South Wales. The usual procedure was for the Royal couple to be driven around town in a motorcade with the route lined by servicemen from all branches.

At the time I was in the Royal Air Force undergoing trade training at RAF St. Asaph not far from Cardiff so I, like just about everyone else on the Station, was picked for this duty. We practiced for a week, marching up and down, rehearsing arms drill and a couple of unusual manoevres one involving changing three ranks to two and then spreading out into two columns. Each man had to count paces as he passed a marker and then halt at different times so we finished up spaced six feet apart on each side of the road. The other drill involved changing a rifle from one shoulder to the other whilst on the march as we were told we would have to march about two miles without a break at one stage during the day.

As it turned out neither drill was necessary as when we were in position an officious little Warrant Officer paced down the middle of the road and made us all shuffle a few inches left or right to suit where he thought was correct. Afterwards the officer in charge either didn't know or forgot about the "changing arms on the march" order and we went the whole way with the rifle on one shoulder.

Of course, we were all in our "best blues" uniform and were issued with a white webbing belt and a rifle with a white sling so, I guess we looked the part even if many of us had only been in the service a few months and we did manage a fairly presentable "present arms" as the Royal entourage drove past.

While the dignitaries dined at the town hall we had lunch at a local drill hall and then went out and did it all again at a different location as they left. They must have been impressed with the sheer numbers of service personnel!

#### Lining the route (Part 2)

Some four years later (than part 1) I was working in Toronto, Canada when Princess Margaret arrived on a Royal Tour. For the benefit of younger readers Princess Margaret was the Queen's younger sister. It happened that the route of the motorcade went past the place where I was working and we were allowed to go outside to watch. The street was lined on both sides by service personnel and police and there were spectators four or five deep on the pavements.

Just as the Royal cars came into view a huge Royal Canadian Mounted Policeman about seven feet tall and dressed in the full dress uniform of scarlet jacket, blue trousers, lemon squeezer hat, knee high brown leather riding boots, belt and holster complete with huge pistol on a white lanyard, broke ranks from about ten yards up on the other side of the street and marched straight over to stand in front of me. "Hello, Peter" he said "what are you up to these days?".

I was acutely aware of my workmates and a fair number of strangers all staring at me obviously thinking I must be some sort of low life well known to the authorities and fervently wished the pavement would open up and swallow me. The pavement refused to cooperate and an agonizing conversation continued until the parade was only a few yards away when my tormentor casually strolled back to his place.

It was some time later that I realized that I had been talking to the owner of the house where my friend and I boarded when I first arrived in Toronto. I knew he was a policeman but did not realize he was a Mountie.
